



A MUSICAL STORY

Today, we are listening to "An Alpine Symphony" by Richard Strauss. This piece of music tells the story of an excursion in the mountains. Will you come along on the adventure?

WHO IS RICHARD

Richard Strauss was born in 1864 in Munich, Germany. His father was the principal horn player in the Bavarian Court Opera in Munich. He took Richard with him from a very young age to the orchestra's rehearsals. Strauss soon caught the musical bug and started to write music alongside his violin and piano lessons. He wrote his first piece at the age of six! Richard was apparently such a diligent composer that by the age of 18 he had written 140 works!



Strauss' wedding was also full of music. He married Pauline de Ahna, a professional singer. Richard enjoyed writing love songs for Pauline. They were happily married all their lives and had a son, Franz. Richard had a vivid imagination and drew inspiration for much of his music from fairy tales, stories and nature. He loved long walks and built a country house near the Zugspitze, the highest peak in Germany. He died in that country house at the age of 85.

DID YOU KNOW THAT

Strauss based his Alpine Symphony on a true story... From his own life!

In 1879, as a young man, Strauss and a few friends went on a long hike in the Alps. The group had planned to climb the mountain at Heimgarten. They enjoyed the lovely views along the way. But a violent storm broke out and the hikers had to flee down the mountain.

Strauss was inspired by this hike and based the music of his "An Alpine Symphony" on the experience. In this work, we experience a musical day in the mountains. In 22 sections, Strauss describes the journey of a hiker climbing a high mountain. For example, he takes us along a sleepy sunrise, a foggy landscape, a brook, a lovely waterfall and a large forest. When the wanderer reaches the summit at last and enjoys the stunning view, fate strikes. The weather turns stormy and he has to flee down the mountainside. An Alpine Symphony closes with a soft sunset.



A DAY IN THE LIFE OF RICHARD

Richard Strauss loved doing the same thing every day. He would get up at the same time every day, and went on two walks a day, played a game of cards over lunch and composed at set times of the day.

Richard Strauss envisioned a grand work for his Alpine Symphony. He wrote for a mega-orchestra of up to 140 musicians. To imagine the story of the mountain hike as vividly as possible, Strauss used unconventional instruments. We will show you a few of the more unusual ones:

Cowbells

We have listened carefully to the fragment on the mountain meadow, and can now recognize this unusual instrument. Strauss brings the grazing cows in the meadow to life by the sound of the cowbells.
